Minutes: The corrected minutes were accepted as unread aloud.

Treasurer’s Report: The Treasurers Report was submitted and passed and is available on request.

New Members: Applications were received from T.J. Jones, Fred Lazzelle, and Tess Kessler. All were approved by voice vote with one abstention.

Facilities: Marty Cantor explained what was done to repair the Gestetner. Bill Ellem noted that the Gestetner had failed at a critical moment, making it unavailable for LOSCON, and he asked if we have a contingency plan other than using a copy shop. Marty explained that the club’s old mimeo and electrostencil equipment has not been kept up, and the cost of keeping it available (even if the obsolete components can be found to make repairs) was not as economical as using a copy shop for emergencies. The directors concluded there was no reason to keep the old Gestetner 460 mimeo and the Gestetner e-stenciller, and made plans to offer it to the members.

Bob Null said he had gotten rid of some computer junk. He outlined his plans to upgrade various computers. The directors confirmed he has a free hand to update the systems.

Bob Null asked about the status of having the plumbing redone in our buildings. Liz said the plan was to get a quote so she could include the cost in the annual budget. Bill said he had asked Bob to contact Masterserve to get a quote so she could include the cost in the annual budget. Bob advocated using plumbers referred by our members, which has worked in the past.

Ed Green suggested there be a thorough housecleaning of the buildings in January.

Archives: Bill Ellem said a copy of the letter from L. Ron Hubbard had been given to Ed for professional evaluation and another copy was put into the archives.

Library: Michael Mason is getting more stuff brodarted. There's been a run on Terry Pratchett books as people discover him and decide they're going to read everything he's written.

Emergency Phone, E-Mail lists: Karl Lembke had made no progress in the last month due to commitments at LOSCON. Ed Green said when the list is completed, they will work on the opt-in issue.

LOSCON 28: Elayne reported the convention had 1,299 members and would probably turn over between \$9-10,000. There had been only three bounced checks.

LOSCON 29: Tadao announced his guests of honor, which included writer David Weber and fan Patty Wells. He is looking forward to turning the whole hotel into a space station.

LALACON: Co-chair Scott Beckstead said the memberships will be \$14.92 in advance and \$20.02 at the door. Marty Cantor said *DE PROFUNDIS* will begin publicizing the event in January.

BY-LAWS: Ellem planned to have a working group at his place in January. They would also be used to formulate a facility usage policy. Ellem said the correction of the Bylaws has been delayed for various reasons. He had brought a set of materials for anyone who is interested.

Clubhouse 25th Anniversary: Ellem read a letter from Charlie Jackson 2 asking to hold a buffet-style banquet at the clubhouse, with speakers, in honor of our 25th anniversary at the present location. Costs would be covered by the sale of dinner tickets. No club funds would be required. Elayne, seconded by Joe Zeff, moved to allow Charlie to proceed.

The directors discussed at length whether they want to do something grander and more upscale than proposed. Kim reminded the directors that we needed to decide whether to accept Charlie's proposal, and not try to figure out what to add to it. Michael Mason moved to postpone consideration of the motion until next meeting. Bob Null said it would be a good idea to see if any other proposals are offered. Karl said CLJ2 would get credit for getting the ball rolling either way. The motion to table passed by voice vote unopposed.

Equipment: Bill Ellem said that Elizabeth Klein-Lebbink asked to use

the LOSCON/SCIFI art show stuff for ConJose, the 2002 Worldcon. It would be transported about two weeks before the con, and returned a week after the con. Elayne said the club has made such loans in the past for \$25 per bag (there are about 27 bags). The directors moved to loan the equipment, and passed the motion by voice vote, unopposed.

City Government: Marty Cantor said the City of Los Angeles is putting together neighborhood councils. Marty has been going to meetings of the one for North Hollywood. He wanted to (1) list LASFS as a local organization, (2) be named as LASFS' representative to the council, and (3) offer the clubhouse for the group to meet on January 7, 2002.

The directors generally felt the first two points were fine. Several strongly objected to having the group meet at the clubhouse, either because it would draw attention to possible noncompliance with various requirements, or because the place is not spiff enough for public meetings (particularly the rest room). Elayne moved to nominate Marty Cantor as LASFS' delegate to the neighborhood council, and to list LASFS as a local organization. The motion passed by voice vote, unopposed.

The Board thanked outgoing director Kim marks Brown for her service to the club. The meeting adjourned at 12:30 pm.

FANZINES

Fanzines are a basic part of science fiction fandom, having been in existence as long as fandom itself – the past 70 years. Fanzines are a reflection of many fans' interest in the printed word and amateur publishing. The publication you are reading this in is a fanzine, but a specialized one. A variety of other fanzines are also available – many of them by request – and this column will cover some of them each issue.

All fanzines are published as a hobby and lose money. Their editors appreciate money to defray their expenses and sometimes list single-copy or subscription prices, but they appreciate even more your written response – a Letter of Comment, or LoC. Feedback – better known in fandom as “egoboo” – is what fanzine publishing is all about.

Check out the fanzine below and broaden your participation in fandom.

Science-Fiction Five-Yearly occupies a unique position among fanzines: it has been published *regularly* since 1951. Once every lustrum – or half-decade – a new issue appears. For the first twenty-five years Lee Hoffman put them out by herself, but starting in 1976 she began using “guest editors” who did

most of the scut-work of publishing. The first was Terry Hughes, who came back on board for this issue, but whose participation was tragically cut short by his sudden death from a brain tumor shortly before the issue was completed. Geri Sullivan and Jeff Schalles have produced the last couple of issues and have done most of the work on this one.

Over the years *S-FF-Y* has established certain traditions. In #2 (1956) both Robert Silverberg (as "Calvin Aaargh") and Harlan Ellison (as "Nalrah Nosille") started serials which

continued in subsequent issues (although occasionally

in a perfunctory form). Ellison's "Nissassa" was revived in 1996 and has established yet another tradition – that of arriving just in the nick of time to be included. (I might add that I've been in every issue since #3.)

#11 – the 50th Anniversary issue – runs 42 pages of impeccable mimeoing from electrostencilled computer-set type, and the mimeography, following a tradition established in the first issue, makes use of colored inks. In this *S-FF-Y* bears a family resemblance to Geri's own fanzine, *Idea*. And to some extent so do the contents.

Lee Hoffman offers an opening editorial and her blessings upon the enterprise of those who have carried on the task of producing *S-FF-Y*. Kip Williams contributes two fannish song pastiches, "The SF Family" and "All in the SF Family." Greg Benford produces "How to Write a Scientific Paper" from years of pent-up frustrations with reading real scientific papers. Denny Lien turns his post to the Stumpers-L e-list into an article titled "A Treatise on Dot.Com(edy) With Purple Prose" – it deals in "academic" fashion with the lyrics of two '50s rock'n'roll novelty records. Steve Stiles, in addition to a cover takeoff on *2001*, has drawn a full-page piece, "Great Moments from Star Trek By Arthur C. Clarke," which is a great sendup of both *Star Trek* and Clarke.

The star piece of the issue, however, is Dave Langford's "The

Secret History of *Ansible*," a written version of a talk he gave at Tropicon/Fanhistoricon in November, 2000. In its ten pages Dave talks about the (then) 21 year history of *Ansible* by providing a series of anecdotes and quotes which stopped all too soon. Langford wins the Fanwriter Hugo with monotonous regularity every year – but probably is the best fanwriter we have now.

Following Langford's piece is my own "Crime Stalks the Fanworld." I've been writing fanfiction – fiction *about* fans – for *S-FF-Y* for years now. It's both a solid issue and a Fannish Event and I recommend *S-FF-Y* highly.

JOHN STANLEY WOOLSTON

July 16, 1920 - December 25, 2001

January 15, 2002: We just learned of Stan's death yesterday in a letter from his sister Leota, who lives in Garden Grove. She will soon be eighty years old and on the day after Christmas was given the news from Windsor Gardens in Anaheim, where Stan has been under medical care for the past several years.

At the same time she learned of the death of a sister-in-law, and shortly after that a friend and neighbor also passed away.

Actually Stan was lost to us some time ago. When he first went into a home for those with mental problems he still recognized June and me and Leota when we visited him. His main problem seemed to be deafness but when we managed to make him hear, he seemed to know what we were talking about and recognized the names of friends we mentioned. He kept losing his hearing aids but Leota rigged up an ear horn for us to shout into his "good" ear.

But eventually both his vision and his hearing failed and he went downhill physically, reaching the point where he seemed to be living in his own inner world, recognizing no one outside of it.

Stan was born on a farm in Indiana but spent his childhood in Illinois when his family moved across the Wabash River. I'm not sure when they moved to California but my first meeting with Stan was at the 1946 WorldCon (Pacificon I) in Los Angeles, where we also met Rick Sneary. The three of us became lifelong friends.

Stan lived in Garden Grove, some miles south of Bell Gardens, where I was living at the time, and Rick lived in South Gate, a neighboring city of Bell Gardens. With the possible exception of Harry Warner, Jr., Stan and Rick may hold fandom's record for living at the same locations for more years than any other fan. Stan's street name and number changed once or twice over the years but it was still the same location which held a small house, a shed with a job press, a small garden, and rabbit pens.

Due to a club foot, Stan could not serve in the military during World War II but he took on the job of air raid warden. His mother and his sister Leota both served in the WACS. His other sister, Louise, was already married and had three children.

Like most fans from our generation he discovered pulp magazine science fiction in the Thirties. His fan activity may have started before I met him in 1946 as I was pretty much fabled during the war, thanks to the Navy and the Marines. I did have a brief letter exchange with Rick while I was still overseas but wasn't keeping up with who's who in fandom.

Graduating from Santa Ana City College, he became a printer

by trade, and indeed was one of the last of the letterpress printers. His own Chandler and Price job press was used primarily for fanish projects as he usually worked in print shops owned by others.

Stan was one of the original members of the Outlander Society, printing covers and sometimes interior headings for THE OUTLANDER MAGAZINE. He was active in FAPA for quite a while co-publishing with Rick and me, as well as on his own.

He joined the NFFF and became one of its hardest working members as well as one of its most loyal ones. He was among those who initiated N'APA, THE NFFF's amateur press association, and his welcoming letters (to new members and neofans) must have been the best ever written from reports I have heard over the years.

He and I published the 1950 FAN DIRECTORY (I as editor and he as printer)--which included the neat layout of the booklet). He was also official printer for the SOLACON (the 1958 WorldCon). The membership cards were printed on his Lilliputian Press. (By the way, that old press was donated to the Garden Grove Historical Society when Stan's affairs were taken over by a Guardian.)

LASFS was always too far away for Stan to attend but he has made it to weekend OS meetings and parties in the Larea over the years, and we have had many a good time at Stan's place. He never drank alcohol or smoked but he could have as good a time at a party as the next fan and in conversations could be more entertaining and informative than many.

He read in many fields and had a marvelous memory. As for imagination, I have always felt that the sf field lost a great writer because he would not discipline himself to make stories out of the host of unique concepts that he talked about to his friends. He did have a short story published in the old Astounding's Probability Zero Dept. I remember a room party at a convention where the Outlanders had invited James Schmitz for drinks and a quiet place to relax. I think the subject of the conversation was alternate worlds or something along that line and at some point Stan outlined a theory of his. Stan, as shy as Schmitz, suddenly stopped in the middle of a sentence realizing that he was doing all the talking and becoming embarrassed about it. "Good God, man, go on!" said Mr. Schmitz, "don't stop now!" I guess Stan finished his thought but perhaps this helps to show what kind of mind he had and what kind of a man he was.

A kind man, a gentle man, a wild and wonderful thinker. I started missing him back when he was no longer able to recognize friends and relatives. I still do and I always will.

LASFS BY-LAWS






Because the scope of the proposal, the documentation of these changes is too large to reproduce in its entirety in De Profundis.
