Ed Green called the question. There will be a vote now, and another vote next week with no discussion.

Program Committee: No additions. Next week is second vote. 3/29, Mechanical Propulsion Systems visits to show and tell on project to build first anime style robot. 4/19 is the date for the giant auction, where we auction off giants.(They might be giants).

Committee to Gouge: auctioned off ancient video technology, and the motion to apologize which went for \$4.

Fannish Committee Report: Doug Crepeau reported on a fellow who collided head on with a Hummer. He was found to have been using his laptop at the time. Proof that laptops and hummers don't go with driving. Also, Stephen Hawking is scheduled to ride the vomit comet.

reason and ability. It seemed an exercise in excess. Whisky commented, "That's one of the trademarks of the director, Rodriguez."

Christian: If you want to see Rodriguez at his best, see El Mariachi. Hare Hobbs bought Sin City, and didn't have time to see it all the way through. He watched it a few stories at a time, and found it bearable that way.

Jerry Pournelle observed, having grown up in the 30s and 40s, back then comics were different. They were longer, and had literary references in them. Nowadays, comics are done for shock effect. CLJII reviewed an episode of “Crossing Jordan” – SF forensic show. In it, the Boston Medical Examiner’s office was examining a mummy to determine how the mummy was actually killed 3000 years ago. The investigation was sidelined when the mummy turned out to have plastic fillings, and was a murder victim from 3 years ago.

Christian – two items on History Channel. The 300, a documentary of the battle, along with a great deal of the history. Then, in another program, there’s a dissection of the movie. They didn’t trash the movie, but experts pointed out the occasional bits where the movie agreed with history.

Tepper; Last night’s South Park, Lice Capades, was humorously SF, positing intelligent head lice. (Pardon me for interrupting your dream, but...) thinking they were maybe doing too much to the world they were living on.
