Meeting 4054, April 23, 2015
President Matthew B. Tepper, presiding
Karl Lembke, Scribe

He was a member of the Boston Strangers Club, chaired Boskone 1 and 2, and invented the game Interplanetary. (We still have a board). It's sort of based on the Doc Smith universe. He was in FAPA for a long time, and went to almost every Corflu. In memory of Art Widner, we had a moment of silence.

The **Menace** from last meeting were read. Scratch bid \$3.50 to name them "Now it's gone completely out of my head" They were so accepted.

The **Treasurer's report:** We have money, you can't spend it.

We honored tonight's **Patron Saints**:

Patron Saint Bill Warren: Milt Stevens: Board member, worked on committees of early LOSCONs, wrote a comprehensive history of SF cinema in the 50s, done quite a bit of writing in magazines such as Starlog, was in APA-L for 500 weeks, and shows up at LOSCONs he's invited to. He murdered me in a mystery novel, "Fandom as a Way of Death". Matthew Tepper: He was linchpin of a panel discussion on Nero Wolfe.

CLJII: Bill has been forgotten over the years, but he was a very important element in refurbishing of the Burbank clubhouse. Most who worked on it are still around and get remembered. He's despised in many quarters for letting CLJII know where LASFS meets. HE published KWTS and the millennium edition of KWTS. He's mostly retired now, and his major project is figuring out how to go live in Hawaii. Jerry Pournelle: when editor of Nebula Book of the year, he hired Bill Warren to write the essay on the SF films of the year.

Scott Beckstead: Before the Internet, Scott ran Paradox Alley, a BBS, and Bill Warren expressed opinions on the board. Barbara Harmon has known him and Beverly for a long time. Sometimes we're friends, sometimes acquaintances. Bill is a very good friend of cats.

From the Hagiography: Bill Warren was the original LASFS board of directors, wrote *Keep Watching the Skies*, 2 volumes of reviews of '50s SF movies. Bill is also a fan writer and he was LASFS GOH at the 1984 LOSCON.

Bill was Lord High Janitor at the first clubhouse we owned. Bill was a close friend of Bill Rotsler. He served as Rotsler's fannish executor. After Rotsler's death, Bill Warren sent all of the remaining Rotsler illos to Marty Canter for general use in the fanzine world. (*There were thousands of these illos and I have spread them far and wide to fanzine publishers throughout the world. Keeping, of course, a few hundred of them for my own use - and for use in De Profundis, too.* - ed.)

The year that Jerry Pournelle edited the Nebula anthology, Bill Warren wrote the essay on that year's SF. **Patron Saint Bill Warren** was given Three Cheers and Keep Watching the Skies.

Patron Saint Nick Smith: He brought cake! Michelle Pincus notes Nick does an amazing amount for the club that most don't know about. He's an all around good friend. Gavin Claypool. It's very good cake. And you can blame me because I got him to come out for the first time. David Okamura knows him through the filk side of fandom, responsible for ConChord, a storyteller, and makes the auctions very enjoyable. He's always been a gentleman. He's a game tester, and a member of LA Filk-Harmonics.

Nick Smith has recently been inducted into the Filk Hall of Fame, which now has 7 LASFS members among its 40 inductees. John DeChancie: Nick Smith is frighteningly intelligent. He may prove a danger to humanity.

From the Hagiography: Nick is a Filker (*Which I assume means that he misspells words.* - ed.) Nick is a LASFS Board Member and an inductee into the Filk Hall of Fame. **Patron Saint Nick Smith** was given Three Cheers and induction into the Filk Hall of Fame.

Registrar emeritus Michelle Pincus introduced Guest Barry Rosen, who found us on the web. (*He could distinguish us from the spiders?* - ed.)

David Okamura observes **Science Happened**, and will tell about it next week.

Joe Zeff: remembers that one year, back when we were having the contest for most memorable fanfic of the year, he got himself into second place so he could write about Larry and Ed Green, with Larry sitting on the floor of the hall, shouting out "Alms for the Rich" Tim Griffin: Grew up in a family that is a lot of things, especially complicated. Larry was one of the few beacons that let him know being a grown-up need not totally suck. Love his work, but enjoy him as a person even more, and he's the man I want to be when I grow up.

Milt Stevens: One story led to a long-standing LASFS tradition. It was set at a real divorce party, and another member was the android IQ test asking what you can say about chocolate covered manhole covers. John DeChancie: Baltimore Worldcon 1983 -- He had just sold his first novel that winter, and this was his first Worldcon as a pro. Got there and there was his editor, Susan Allison. She introduced him to Larry Niven. They shook hands and he headed up the escalator. Now if only I had a punch line.

Michelle Pincus: At one of her first LOSCONs, they had sent her over to set up the art show, which Fuzzy was running. She saw this distinguished older woman. Fuzzy sent her to get her husband. The only person out there was Larry Niven. CLJII: A story he hasn't told in a long time. When I first joined the LASFS back when dinosaurs ruled the construction site, his first convention was FUNCon. A young fan came up to him and told him he (CLJII) was Larry Niven. He was unable to persuade the kid he wasn't Niven. CLJII thinks the kid was eventually introduced to the real Larry Niven.

Matthew: At the very same convention, had just read World of Ptavvs and Neutron Star. He asked if someone could introduce him to Larry Niven. Tom Digby pointed him at a man who might know where Larry Niven was, and Larry Niven turned out to know exactly where he was.

Jerry Pournelle: in 1980, after the election, Reagan's people asked Col. Kane to write this space plan for the new administration. Jerry had written on the subject, and was recruited to help with the meeting. Where to meet? Larry was willing to host the 80 people, including Buzz Aldrin, nine generals, Max Hunter, and a number of other folks. We worked out the commercial space act during one of those meetings. Larry was sent upstairs with a lawyer to write up the policy. They were stuck there while everyone else enjoyed the gourmet spread.

Scratch: He did a good job. Look it up. "How to save civilization and make a little money".

From the Hagiography: The first person to be honored at a LASFS Fanquet (for his first professional sale) who broke the jinx by selling another piece professionally. Larry is a great writer of hard SF and a gracious and gen-

erous man. Larry is a Regency dancer and he immortalized the chocolate manhole cover. Larry is the husband of Marilyn "Fuzzy Pink" Niven.

Patron Saint Larry Niven was given Three Cheers and One Ring to House them all.

David Okamura observes we had a couple of passings. The Russian supply ship will probably undergo a catastrophic re-entry. Elon Musk's space-x is the next launch, and will probably be crammed full of stuff.

Tim Griffin: Some people have been re-doing their landscaping on account of the drought. He's working with the Theodore Payne foundation to promote California native plants. See him for more info.

Reviews: Milt Stevens reviewed Three Body Problem. It's quite a book, starting with a scene where a character is watching her father get beaten to death by the Red guard. It's got science, super science, sense of wonder, a conspiracy for an alien invasion, and at one point, they turn a proton inside out in six dimensions to make a weapon to use against Earth. (Now that's one Hell of a proton pill.)

Tom Locke reviewed Micro by Michael Crichton. It's typical Crichton fare of technology gone awry. As usual, it has help by someone with nefarious interests. It requires some suspension of disbelief, especially when his shrink ray comes into play. There are serious fallacies. It's an enjoyable read for one reading. It will be donated to the Library.

David Okamura: He came up with some of the most off-the-wall songs and essays, such as the memo on elevator usage. Matthew Tepper: At his first SF convention, Funcon in 1968, he was eager to meet Larry Niven. He encountered Tom Digby and asked him if he knew where Larry Niven is. He said "you might ask that person over there", and that person turned out to be Larry Niven. History does not record whether he in fact knew where Larry Niven was. He gave Matthew a copy of "Probably Something", soon to be his APA-L zine. It was about the power structure in a playing card company. (You're all just a bunch of cards! -- Alice)

Scott Beckstead was introduced to him as "bubbles". He was amused and intrigued by a bubble stuffer at Westercon, a machine that would blow bubbles within bubbles. Joe Zeff: He mentioned having received a job offer from the Mimbari designing environmental tanks for organisms that can't survive in a Terrestrial atmosphere. And he presented the letter.

Jerry Pournelle: It might be worth publishing a list of Tom Digby Probably Something titles. CLJII: He was the sort of person who, if he existed, would live around the corner from a place that sold dill pickle ice cream. And he did. Karl Lembke: Tom Digby, along with others, invented Putridos, which started as a list of simple hex patches that would update a blank, formatted disk to Putrodos 1.0. Among features in Putrodos was "GuessAhead", where the computer would complete commands for the user with what it thought the user should intend to be typing. Of course, the computer's idea of what the user intended to type and the user's idea weren't always in sync, leading to odd results. Of course, nobody in his right mind would program such a feature into a real electronic device...

CLJII: In APA-L at one point, Tom and he created the Mergerville Newspaper, made a point of referring to an article from it every week, and every week it had merged with another paper, and added another name to a string of increasing length..

From the Hagiography: Whimsical and insightful fan writer and poet and one of the Fan Guests at Confrancisco (Worldcon 1993, San Francisco, California). Lee Gold published an anthology of his writing in 1993: *Tom Digby along Fantasy Way*.

Tom was known for unique and creative personal presentations. The Larry Niven story, "What Can You Say About Chocolate Covered Manhole Covers?" featured Tom

Digby as the alien robot.

In his APA-L Zine, "Probably Something", he once wrote that it must have been fascinating to live near the airport in the last century, because you'd only be disturbed by clip clop of horses as they took off.

Patron Saint Tom Digby was given Three Cheers and Little Teeny Eyes.

David Okamura updated us all on **Science**. The Russian supply capsule having crashed, they've canceled the crew rotation on the Space Station. They want to study why the third stage separated too soon, since they use the same module in crew capsules.
