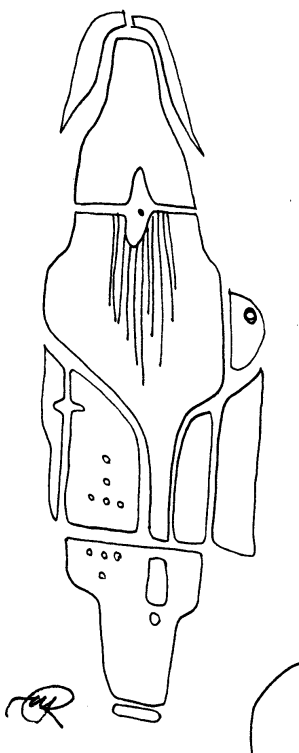

He was so good at putting together disparate pieces of film that it was a joy to watch him work. He and CLJII collaborated on several stories, which were not completed at the time of his death. Longtime Scribe, almost at the skill level of Jack Harness. In youth, he

worked on conventions and was part of Arson, Rape, and Bloody Murder. He also inspired James Wong Hound, alias David McDog, in Amazing Adventures.

Phil Castora: Having held the office of Scribe, he notes that some of his turns of phrase that were well received were inspired by Ted. No one else has ever come close to his ability to describe what went on. Reading the minutes was like re-living the meeting, even one he hadn't attended. Bill Ellem: When the LASFS met in the basement of a building, the meetings were much smaller. Meetings were about the size of the attendance when we have a program. Into this meeting came six high-schoolers, including Steve Tolliver, Ted Johnstone, and George Fields, who were the most prominent individuals. All these people came in under noms-de-plume, because they were unsure of the club. They re-vitalized the club, which soon moved to Zeke Leppin's place. Ted was one of the fanzine editors par excellence. Bill, "a young engineer with more money than sense," would invite the whole crew off to Hawaiian Broiler, and pick up the bill. Ted decided to go pro, and wrote a series of books, all excellent, some truly outstanding. His first U.N.C.L.E. book was outstanding. To Jerry Pournelle, Ted Johnstone was always David McDaniel. They met in Chicago at the 1962 Worldcon. He introduced himself as a hobbit, and was the right size for it. He was as good a storyteller as this field has had. Including JP and Niven. Not as good a writer, in part because the craft of writing requires that you do a lot of it, and he hated to write more than anyone else JP has ever met. David never wrote the millions of words needed to become good at his craft. He was as talented as any. Maybe not an Anderson, but he was a very good storyteller.

One time, Jerry commissioned a story from him, and made the mistake of paying him before the story was in his hands. He finally would go over to his house, take his kid out to the park, giving him a couple of hours, and would bring over a fifth of whiskey, or a six-pack of very good beer, in exchange for twenty pages. Hard to say anything bad, except he was the most procrastinating SOB he's ever met. Ted is also Jerry's favorite example of what's wrong with pot. Ted discovered that the high from pot was just as good, if not better, than the high from giving birth to a written and published story, and not nearly as much work.

Read his story, "The Quiet Village." Mike Glyer recalled that Ted was Secretary when Mike was President. One evening, someone had submitted a funny piece of business. When it came time to deal with new business, the motion was set in an ashtray and set on fire. When the fire died down, David stated that no new business was on the table in writing.

Ted introduced Ed Green to hash. (So, which is better, hash or spam?) Jerry Pournelle remarked that David was correspondent named in a divorce. LosCon 30: Teddy Harvia is the Artist Guest of Honor, an excellent
choice!

LaLaCon: The chair thanked the co-chair and the rest of the staff. The
turnout was good and everybody had a good time. He asked permission
to start on the next one, rumored to be called LaLaConfidential.

Comania: Various personal emergencies have made work on this
difficult, but there should be a presentation by the next meeting, and a no-
charge event on July 27. The event has been renamed Commotion.

Marketing Committee: Arlene distributed a write-up of the
committee's mission, goals, and projects. Among other things, they're
working on a welcome packet for new members and will coordinate
with Marty Cantor.

Bylaws and Standing Rules: Nothing new. (*So we let the Standing
Rules sit down and rest. - ed.*)

New Business: Tadao asked permission to use the club's name and
clubhouse in various videos he's working on the promote both us and his
own acting career. These would be short subjects about the club, club
history, and stories about the club. Of course, any stories would be
designed to show the club in the best possible light. He'd be more than
willing to donate part of any proceeds to the club. Ed Green moved to
give him permission, on the condition that we get more detail on his
plans at the next board meeting, before anything gets released. Liz

FANZINE REVIEW COLUMN

Fanzines are a basic part of science fiction fandom, having
been in existence as long as fandom itself – the past 70
years. Fanzines are a reflection of many fans' interest in the
printed word and amateur publishing. The publication you
are reading this in is a fanzine, but a specialized one. A
variety of other fanzines are also available – many of them
by request – and this column will cover some of them each
issue.

All fanzines are published as a hobby and lose money. Their
editors appreciate money to defray their expenses and
sometimes list single-copy or subscription prices, but they

appreciate even more your written response – a Letter of Comment, or LoC. Feedback – better known in fandom as “egoboo” – is what fanzine publishing is all about.

Check out the fanzine below and broaden your participation in fandom.

SLEIGHT OF HAND #1, Spring/Summer 2002 (John Teehan, 499 Douglas Ave., Providence, RI 02908; “Copies available for \$2 (\$3 outside the US) or The Usual;” e-mail to tumble@ids.net)

John Teehan read SF most of his life, but only recently discovered fandom and fanzines. Last year’s Worldcon in Philadelphia was his first convention, which he attended with some hesitation, and “In the weeks that followed MilPhil, I discovered Bill Burns’ wonderful efanazines.com website and the Memoryhole, Timebinders and Trufen e-lists.” With his discovery of fanzines came his discovery of fandom’s history: “I’m mostly just sitting and soaking in the stories. Fandom has such a rich history that’s very hard to describe.”

And, inevitably, John wanted to do a fanzine of his own. *Sleight of Hand #1* is the result. Frankly, I wish my first fanzine had been half as good. The fanzine runs 28 letter-sized pages, but is printed on sheets twice as large, folded and saddle-stapled. Like virtually all modern fanzines (except *Twink*) it’s produced on a computer. Large, readable Adobe Garamond type is set in a double-columned format. Art is sprinkled nicely through the text.

But the key to any fanzine is its written contents, and here once again *Sleight of Hand* triumphs. John has gotten his main article from Dave Langford, whose groaning bookshelf full of Fan Writer Hugos was well and honestly won. Langford’s “Microcon Metamorphoses” is the speech he gave at Microcon in March, 1999. It hasn’t dated at all and is a delight to read.

Rich brown’s “Why I Only ‘Used To’ Know That Diana Rigg Was A Natural Red-Head” is a rewrite of an e-list post of rich’s in which he explains how he came to see Diana Rigg nude, from a distance of perhaps 20 feet – with several digressions thrown in for good measure.

Mike Resnick’s “Tales of the Prozines” is a good demonstration of Resnick’s ability as a story-teller, and his willingness to hold actual facts at bay when they get in the way of his stories. Since these purport to be *true* stories, let the reader beware – several are embroidered into fantasy and many incidental facts and details are wrong. But they make an enjoyable read.

The last Big Name in the issue is Janis Ian – the creator, more than 40 years ago, of “Society’s Child,” an improbable

pop hit a year after its release. She too read SF for many years, but only just discovered fandom. Her “Worldcon Diary: How I Spent My Summer Vacation,” which first appeared on her website, describes the buildup to and her attendance at the same Philadelphia Worldcon at which John got his toes wet. It’s a bit of a gosh-wow piece, but that’s not bad, considering its source.

In addition to a couple of minor items, and a page of “Ten-Second Reviews” by the editor, there’s a letter column – in *Sleight of Hand*’s first issue. It’s made up of a running conversation which first occurred on one of the fannish e-lists after John announced his intention to do a fanzine and asked for advice. Next issue will have actual letters of comment.

All in all, this fanzine is superior to most first issues, especially by those with no prior experience. I feel no hesitation in recommending it, and I’m looking forward to #2.

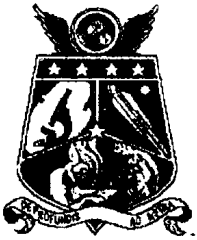
