Outreach: The Copyright Registration Seminar is on schedule, and Francis has gotten his own copyright lawyer to give a talk. Francis found a mention on-line, just by chance, and is planning another press release. He has samples of his material for anybody that wants to see what he's doing.

Mailing Lists: Karl has over sixty names on the Emergency list and also has an over-flow list. Next, we need to decide what gets sent to that list and who moderates it. Bill Ellern, seconded by Michael Mason moved that the Chairman of the Board and club President be put in charge of this, with a third person (unspecified) as back-up. Ed Green noted that the two named positions have backups already, as noted in the Bylaws. It was agreed that the motion would be changed to read that "the designated successors" be appointed. This passed without dissent.

Archives: The Bruce Memorial Book from Westercon is now in the archives.

Events: Dr. Arizona has a proposal for a Cra ft Faire. Crafters will be charged for table space and a percentage of sales over a specific minimum. Except for printing costs, there should be no club funds needed. A bake sale and demos will round out the event. This will be open to the general public, not just members. Bill Ellem and Marty Cantor pointed out possible competition, as we don't want to be caught across from a bigger, better known event. After discussion, we moved to approve the idea and have Dr. Gleason run with it.

Festival of Books: We've sent a check but not gotten a reply as yet.

LosCons of the Future: Ed Green went first. His theme will be "Welcome to Los Angeles," but he's expecting his committee to run with it in ways he can't predict. He has the proper minimum committee, all experienced. Second, Greg Bilan, with a theme of "Realm of Fantasy," to remind people of the other half of our name. He'd like to focus on mixes of SF and Fantasy in various genre, and has the proper committee. After a question and answer period, both were sent on to the membership for final approval. Ed Green noted the amount of hard work that Greg put into his bid, finding it one of the best-prepared bids in recent years.

LosCon 30: The committee is almost complete, and a meeting is scheduled for late March.

LosCon 29: There are still two outstanding debts and leftover program books are going to the Festival of Books. Fred Patten is going over various versions of the history. We've received a letter of thanks from the Salvation Army for George Mulligan's Toy Drive.

LaLaCon: The new date is May 3 and 4. If it works this year, we may make Cinco De Mayo weekend the standard date.

Back to LosCons: The new contracts are signed and on the premises. We're putting them into Oink Oink Flap Flap.

Neighborhood Council: Marty Cantor and Allan Rothstein are running for seats, not against each other. All who live or work in the area are eligible to vote on Feb 28 and March 1 at the North Hollywood Police station.

New Business: Marty Cantor brought up the possibility of members donating stock to the club. As stock needs to be managed, we will eventually need people to do this. It was agreed to defer this to the next meeting. Mike Thorsen pointed out some cabinets he'd made from steel shelving and peg board, and suggested that we may want to make more. The eventual decision was to leave it up to our Space Cadet. We tabled discussion of a Board Retreat until March, and Ed asked that the Emergency procedures be reviewed. We told him to Make it So.

It was moved and seconded that we run screaming into the afternoon at 1:15 PM.

FANZINES

Fanzines are a basic part of science fiction fandom, having been in existence as long as fandom itself – the past 70 years. Fanzines are a reflection of many fans' interest in the printed word and amateur publishing. The publication you are reading this in is a fanzine, but a specialized one. A variety of other fanzines are also available – many of them by request – and this column will cover some of them each issue.

All fanzines are published as a hobby and lose money. Their editors appreciate money to defray their expenses and sometimes list single-copy or subscription prices, but they appreciate even more your written response – a Letter of Comment, or LoC. Feedback – better known in fandom as "egoboo" – is what fanzine publishing is all about.

Check out the fanzine below and broaden your participation in fandom.

Ray Nelson has become a legend in fandom. He has been a fan for more than half a century, and, as a cartoonist, it was he (circa 1949) who created the self-mocking image of fans wearing propeller beanies. A dedicated bohemian for most of his life, Ray moved to Paris in the '50s, where he met his wife, Kirsten and their son Walter was born. At the end of that decade Ray (and family) returned to the United States and he's been at the same address in El Cerrito ever since.

In the 1960s Ray began writing and selling science fiction professionally (his "Tum Off The Sky" in F&SF was bumped from the 1964 Hugo ballot by unfortunate politics) and in the '70s he was publishing SF novels. Over the years Ray has pursued many interests – and in the new millennium he has returned to doing fanzines.

Uncle Smiley's Bookcase is an 8-page fanzine which is mailed out in a letter-sized envelope for one-ounce firstclass postage. It's moderately frequent and basically unpretentious, informal and newsletter-like – but that doesn't mean Ray doesn't use it as a vehicle for some serious thinking.

Six pages of the current issue (all but the front and back covers) are devoted to Ray's "Being God in Your Own Little Universe," in which he takes us through a relatively brief sketch of his evolving life as an existentialist. This "sketch" is "illustrated" with a series of poems, many of them quite short, which were written in the course of his philosophical travels. They tend to be paradoxically simple, but usually express complex emotions and insights.

The rest of the issue? In an opening-page "Editorial," Ray tells us that "the beanie has ventured forth into new realms, most notably the 'geek culture.' I have totally lost control of it & can no longer use it as a signature. With a sigh I release it to the universe." His replacement is the beret.

As usual, the issue closes with a brief, one-page letter column. The contributors to this one are Robert Lichtman (editor/publisher of *Trap Door*), Trina Robbins (long-time fan, well-known feminist and underground/overground cartoonist and artist) and Harry Warner, Jr. (fan historian and author of *All Our Yesterdays* and *A Wealth of Fable*) – which tells you something about Ray's current mailing list.

Write Ray and ask for a copy. This kind of personalized communication is what fanzines are all about.

LASFS FUGGHEAD CONTEST

LASFS has a long history with this form of fundraising for the club. At times these contests have ended in acrimony with some "contestants" feeling that the nastiness of the name made them the butts of ridicule. Whilst good humour was usually the motives behind the nominations, in the past when objections were raised, the contests were ended.

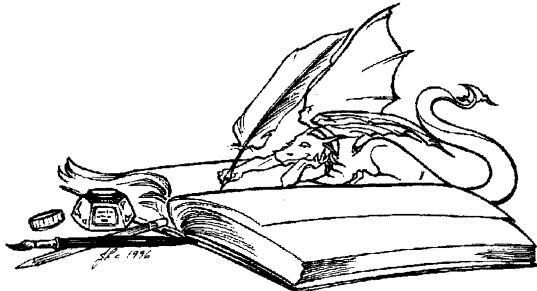
