Special Orders of Business:

Lots of SF-related birthdays today, so I will only mention a few of them.

Writer Garth Ennis, whose work on comics and graphic novels keeps getting adapted for movies and TV, such as the series *Preacher* and the recent *The Boys*. Screenwriter, director and composer John Carpenter, who has been doing SF and horror stuff since his initial offering of *Dark Star*, in 1974.

Actress Caroline Munro, who was the only good thing in some of her movies, but who had major roles in such films as *The Golden Voyage of Sinbad*, *The Spy Who Loved Me*, and the infamous *Starcrash*.

A final birthday greeting to the late John Hamilton, whose role as Perry White in the *Superman* TV show of the 1950s overshadowed the hundreds of other acting roles in his long career, including parts in a *Flash Gordon* serial, *Donovan's Brain*, *Captain America*, *Zorro's Black Whip*, and even *The Maltese Falcon*, from 1930 to his death in 1958.

Matthew mentioned Alva Rogers, a con runner and fan for many years, born this day in 1923.

We lost fan artist Steve Stiles, who had a total of 14 Hugo nominations as Fan Artist from 1967 to 2016, finally winning that last time. He was the TAFF winner in 1968. He won the Faan Award at Corflu as best artist *eleven times* including 2018. He was known to LASFS folks as the first recipient of the Rotsler award, in 1998. Professionally, he first worked in both mainstream and underground comics. He gave that up for advertising art, because he decided that comics would never last. He was both a fan and a pro starting in the early 1960s, and is credited with creating the fannish phrase "Death is nature's way of telling you when to stop."

Marty said that Steve Stiles was suffering from cancer, and had told people online that he had been given just a few months to live, but in fact he died just days later. Christopher Tolkien, age 95, passed away today. He was the literary executor of J. R. R. Tolkien, and edited the posthumous works of his father.

Neil Peart of Rush passed away, and Rush was very connected to SF and fantasy in their music.

Patron Saint Jeff Siegel: Per the club's notes, he graduated from the Air Force Academy, became a cryptographer and a minister, all long AFTER he had joined the club, at the age of 11. He was a longtime friend of Alex Pournelle.

Arena Cinelounge is featuring both an SF movie and a science movie this week. The science documentary is called *The End of Quantum Reality*, while the SF movie is called *The Wave*.

The Egyptian Theater in Hollywood is showing *Freaked* on Friday the 17th at 7:30 pm. This is an odd cult SF film that includes Keanu Reeves, Brooke Shields and Mr. T in the cast. Those three won't be there, but others from the cast and production company will be at the theater to talk about it after the screening. George and his sister have been following a Russian science fiction series about robots. He feels that it has a compelling story line, and thinks that John Campbell might have liked it. Called Better Than Us.

I must begin by apologizing to our mechanical overlords for the omission of Karel Cepek from the birthday list two weeks ago. This Czech author of SF created many things, including the word Robot, in the story *Rossum's Universal Robots*. I live in hope that I may now be permitted access to Google once more.

Today was the anniversary of the birth of author Walter M. Miller, Jr. His *A Canticle for Leibowitz* was the only novel he wrote that was published during his lifetime, as he was mainly a short story writer. (*So, he wrote A Can Tickle for Leibowitz. I wonder who wrote A Can't Tickle for Leibowitz?* - ed.) Upon his death, it was discovered that he had written a sequel, which Terry Bisson cleaned up and handed to the publisher. It was called *St. Leibowitz and the Wild Horse Woman*.

It was also the anniversary of the birth of fan and pro Tom Reamy. After several years as a very active fan with a Hugo-nominated fanzine, he finally turned pro. He sold a novel and over a dozen short stories in a very brief time, and was named the John W. Campbell award-winner for best new writer for 1976, while being heavily nominated for Hugo and Nebula awards. He also co-wrote a play with Howard Waldrop. He even sold Harlan Ellison a story for *The Last Dangerous Visions*. Sadly, Mr. Reamy died at his typewriter while working on a new story.

It is also the anniversary of the birth of actor Rutger Hauer, whose fannish career included *Blade Runner*, *Ladyhawke* and the movie version of *Buffy the Vampire Slayer*, as well as a host of other fannish TV and movie roles.

Also, LASFS members Craig Miller and Michelle Mills had their birthdays today.

Comedian, historian, author and director Terry Jones, of Monty Python's Flying Circus, died on Tuesday. In addition to his work with the other Pythons on the TV show, he wrote, directed or co-wrote most of their movies, as well as writing the script for the film *Labyrinth*. His work on historical books and television series had kept him active until the final Monty Python reunion in 2014, after which his health suffered.

Also, actor John Karlen passed away here in Burbank this week. Non-fans know him best from his ongoing TV roles in shows like *Snoops* and as the husband in *Cagney & Lacy*, but fans may also remember him from his fantasy and horror roles. He was in 182 episodes of *Dark Shadows*, for example, and his character was the one who let Barnabas Collins out of his coffin, beginning the story line which took over the show for most of the rest of its run.

Bill mentioned that Peter Alan Fields, who produced *Deep Space Nine* for two seasons, and co-wrote *The Inner Light* episode [with Morgan Grendel], as well as other *Star Trek* stuff. He passed away several months ago, but his passing had not been noted here.

Expert on the history of piracy, she has written and spoken on things related to that subject, and has been a talking head on various TV documentaries on the subject. **Patron Saint Gail** Selinger was given Three Cheers and pieces of eight...

Science News:

Bill mentioned *Starcraft 2*, and that an AI is now one of the top 500 players of this online game. Also, sleep is an anxiety-reducer.

NASA's planet-hunting experiments are bearing unusual fruit. One of their high school interns discovered a planet that actually orbits two stars, which themselves are an eclipsing binary pair. When George Lucas had Tatooine with two suns in the first *Star Wars* movie, astrophysicists said that would never happen, but here it is.

In addition, one of their other high school interns noticed an error in the description of a star, leading scientists to look at the data again. Once they did, it appears they have found a planet that would have enough gravity to maintain an Earth-like atmosphere, combined with a temperature that would permit liquid water. The problem is that the planet, about 100 light years away, orbits its star in only 37 days, and appears to be tidally locked. Still, they want to look more for such planets once the Webb space telescope launches in the near future.

Also, some of our next generation of robot overlords may have feathers. As you may have noticed, birds are maneuverable in flight in ways that a fixed-wing airplane is not. There is currently a study on bird aeronautics in progress, and in order to study the actual effects of moveable wings on flight, the scientists built sort of a robot pigeon, complete with feathers on the trailing edges of the wings. So, if you see a bird in the park pecking at crumbs of rust...

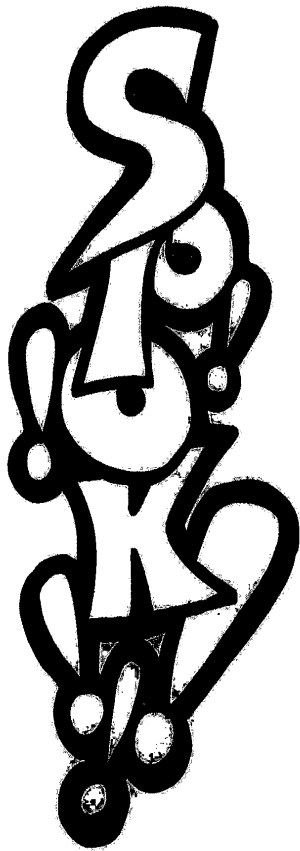
